

Join us for our free public planetarium shows at **6pm** *or* **7:30 pm many Fridays throughout the summer!** Seating is limited to 60 people, including 10 walk-ins. Reserve seats at noon on the Sunday prior to a show. Walk-in seats are first-come, first-served, so please arrive at least 20 minutes beforehand to maximize your chances of getting a seat. WSU Students should also check the WSU Events Calendar for student-only show offerings.

Join us for a free public planetarium show!

Our Friday night shows are geared towards a general audience and last about 60 minutes. Join our staff for a live talk about star formation and some of the stars you can see in the current night sky over Detroit, along with a 30 minute full-dome film.

Show Dates and Times

Shows are held at 6pm and 7:30pm several Fridays throughout the summer. Shows begin promptly at their scheduled start time, and reserved ticket holders should arrive at least 10 minutes prior to show time, after which their seats will be released to walk-ins. Late arrivals will not be admitted.

Health guidelines

For the safety of the staff:

Planetarium guests are encouraged to wear a mask for the duration of the show. The planetarium is a small enclosed venue and we appreciate your assistance in keeping us all healthy.

Ticket Availability

50 seats are available for reservation here **at noon on the Sunday prior to a show.** You may reserve up to 4 seats, but please only reserve as many as you need. A handful of walk-in seats are also available- we recommend you only attempt to claim walk-in seats if you are a student or live in midtown, as they can be extremely limited. WSU Students should also check the WSU Events Calendar for student-only show offerings.

Parking Information

The nearest WSU parking garages with visitor parking are garages 6 and 8. See http://parking.wayne.edu/visitors/index.php for maps and fees.

On-street parking is also available; the city charges \$1.00 per hour and takes cash, credit cards, or you can use their mobile app ParkDetroit on your phone for payment. Other private cash lots are also available in the area.

Finding the Planetarium on Wayne State University's Campus

The planetarium is located on the lower lever of the Old Main building - the historic building with the clock tower on the corner of Cass and Warren Avenues in Detroit. If you enter through the main entrance on Cass Avenue, take the stairs down and walk straight ahead - you'll see the Planetarium murals and our double doors - room 0209.

For Families

On some Saturday mornings of the summer the planetarium offers a free show geared towards families with children 10 and under, our *Young Astronomers Show*. While children are welcome at Friday night shows, they may prefer the *Young Astronomer's Show* content. These shows last just about an hour, have content and a movie geared towards children, and may be best for young children who have trouble sitting quietly through a longer, more complex presentation. Please check our main eventbrite page to see if any Young Astronomers Shows are upcoming.

Interested in bringing a large group to the planetarium?

The planetarium can be reserved for private showings for school groups, scout troops, birthday parties or by other organizations for a fee. Please fill out our group reservation form for more information so we can help you design a show to meet your needs.

Unexpected closures

If the planetarium needs to close due to staff illness, bad weather or another unexpected situation, we will e-mail all registered attendees, so **please be sure our eventbrite e-mails are not hiding in your SPAM folder.** We also try to post alerts about closings on our Facebook Page and in our Facebook events, and on our website as soon as we can, but these often take a bit more time. If an event is cancelled on our end, we will offer you an alternate Friday to attend instead.

Tickets for public shows are always FREE.

Any posts you see about tickets for sale are scams. We regularly check posts on our facebook page and have never found any to be people on our registered guest list.

Recipient Rights Corner



ExpertCare would like to first thank you for providing the highest quality care to your Recipient. ExpertCare wants to ensure the safety of our Recipients and continue to give you the tools to provide safe, quality care and wellbeing. Below are incidents that resulted in Recipient Rights violations. Please review the following Rights reminders to prevent further violations.

⇒While providing services, all Recipients shall receive services suited to his/her condition. This can include but not limited to, treatment in the correct environment and the right setting for services. During this time, the Recipient must be working towards goals in the plan of service. Community Living Supports are used to increase or maintain personal self-sufficiency, facilitating an individual's achievement of his/her goals of community inclusion and participation, independence, or productivity. Caregivers must be present, working one on one with a Recipient on the Recipient's goals for the entire shift, either in the Recipient's home or the Recipient's community. Caregivers cannot take a Recipient to the Caregiver's home or a Caregiver's family member's home.

⇒ExpertCare Management Services takes the privacy of personal health information (PHI) seriously. A number of laws and regulations including the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA), Public Act 258 and the Michigan Mental Health Code protect PHI. Caregivers should never share any confidential information with others. Caregivers cannot have family, friends, or any visitors accompany them or meet them at the Recipient's home or out in the community. Caregivers are to always protect confidential information. For example, Caregivers may not take the Recipient to a Caregiver's family member's home and the Caregiver can not disclose to others that the individual they are working with is a recipient of community mental health services.

⇒Caregivers will treat all Recipients and Recipient's family members with Dignity and Respect. Caregivers must treat Recipients and Recipients' family members with esteem, honor, politeness, consideration, and in a manner that is not condescending or demeaning. For example, Caregivers cannot voice their political opinions, religious views and/or provide their opinion or recommendations regarding child discipline to the Recipient or Recipient's Guardian.

When providing care to a Recipient there are many rules that need to be followed and at times these can be difficult to remember. If you have questions or concerns about your case or do not fully understand the IPOS, please call ExpertCare. We are here to help you better understand the Recipient's Rights before it becomes a violation. We appreciate your attention to this matter. 



JUANITA RESZKOWSKI

ECare: What made you decide to become a Caregiver?

Juanita: I had taken care of several family members until they passed away. The last person I cared for was my Aunt, I cared for her for 5 years. When she passed away my life seemed empty, my days were now empty, I had no one to care for. I had always liked caring for others so I decided to take a college course on becoming a professional Caregiver to learn all aspects of what was required to become a caregiver of others.

ECare: What have you always wanted to try and never did?

Juanita: I have always wanted to fly in a Hot Air Balloon, but there are no Hot Air Balloon places here in Michigan that I know of.

ECare: What is the most rewarding experience you have had as a Caregiver?

Juanita: Knowing that you are helping others who are not able to care for themselves, helping them enjoy the things they otherwise would not be able to enjoy or experience.

ECare: What do you do for fun?

Juanita: For fun I like bargain shopping. Finding good deals on personal items, as well as items for my home.

ECare: What are three foods you can't live without?

Juanita: Three foods I can't live without would be Mexican food, Italian food and Chinese food. These are the foods I most enjoy eating.

ECare: What is your best piece of advice for other Caregivers?

Juanita: The best piece of advice I can give to other caregivers is too always have patience with the person put in your care, I know sometimes things can get hectic when caring for others and you are trying your best to give them the understanding they need, but every person put into our care is different and have different needs and we need to try our best to meet their needs and give them the care and understanding they are seeking.

ECare: What is the first concert you attended?

Juanita: The first concert that I attended was when I was in high school it was a new band called Chickorea. { Not sure of the spelling of the name } They were performing at the Pontiac Silverdome. So you can probably guess how long ago that was.

ECare: What have you learned from your Caregiving experience that has helped you in other aspects of your life?

Juanita: What I have learned from my experience as a caregiver that I have incorporated into other aspects of my life is to be sure to take care of myself first. To be aware of my capacities for checking my own health needs first, because if I'm not able to care for myself I will not be capable of caring for others.

Juanita has been a dedicated and valuable team member of ExpertCare for the past 2 years. Her nomination is a testament to her hard work and the positive impact she has made on the people she works with. It's particularly inspiring to hear that Juanita's kindness and reliability have been recognized, as well as her flexibility with scheduling.



Frequent Mental Distress

U.S. Value: 14.7%

Healthiest State: Hawaii: 10.7%

Least-healthy State: West Virginia: 19.3%

Arizona/New Mexico/California: AZ #32 - 15.4% / NM #22 - 14.5% / CA #21 - 14.4%

Definition: Percentage of adults who reported their mental health was not good 14 or more days in the past 30 days.

Who is affected?

The prevalence of frequent mental distress is higher among:

- Women compared with men.
- Adults ages 18-44 compared with those ages 45 and older.
- Multiracial and American Indian/Alaskan Native adults compared with Hawaiian/Pacific Islander and Asian adults.
- Adults with less than a high school education compared with those with a high school diploma or GED degree and college graduates.
- Adults with an annual household income of \$25,000 or less compared with those with higher income levels.
- · Adults who have a disability compared with those who do not have a disability.
- · Adults who are unemployed or unable to work compared with employed adults.

Research corner: Frequent Mental Distress

Why does this matter?

A healthy mental state is essential to overall positive health and wellbeing. In some cases, poor mental health may lead to suicide. Frequent mental distress aims to capture the population experiencing persistent, and likely severe, mental health issues, defined by 14 or more days of self-reported poor mental health in the past month. There is a strong relationship between the 14day period and clinically diagnosed mental disorders, such as depression and anxiety. Frequent mental distress is associated with smoking, physical inactivity, housing insecurity, food insecurity and insufficient sleep.
